

This dessert combines both brownies and ice cream and provides many opportunities for customization. You can also make the dessert as easy or as time intensive as you desire. First, we make the brownie layer. Then we make the ice cream layer and spread on top of the brownie.

Brownie Layer

Ingredients:

- 1 cup granulated sugar
- 1 cup light or dark brown sugar
- 2 tsp. vanilla extract
- 1/2 tsp. salt
- 4 eggs
- 2 sticks of butter
- 1/2 cup all-purpose flour
- 1/2 cup cocoa powder
- 8 oz. butterscotch chips

Recipe:

- Preheat oven to 350° F.
- Whisk eggs in a bowl.
- Add vanilla extract, granulated sugar, brown sugar, and salt to the same bowl and mix until fully incorporated.
- Melt the butter and butterscotch chips and mix (use chocolate chips instead if you prefer).
- Combine both mixtures. Fold in flour and cocoa powder.
- Pour mixture into greased baking pan.
- Bake for 30-35 minutes and let cool.

Ice Cream Layer

Ingredients:

- eolale Surpise - 1 ¾ cup heavy cream
- 1¹/₄ cup whole milk
- 3/4 cup granulated sugar
- 1 tbsp. vanilla extract
- 1/8 tsp. salt (or 2 pinches)
- Oreos (optional)

Recipe:

- Combine 1 cup heavy cream (you'll use the rest later), sugar, and salt in a pot over medium heat. Stir until sugar is dissolved.

- Remove the mixture from heat. Add the rest of the heavy cream, whole milk, and vanilla extract to the pot.

- Freeze the mixture (or use an ice cream maker machine).

- Once frozen, scoop ice cream into a blender with Oreos (optional) and dairy product of choice (i.e. half and half, heavy cream, milk, etc).

- When desired consistency is met, scoop ice cream on top of brownies and place in freezer.

- Enjoy!



This year marks 50 years since HSPVA was founded in 1971. Over the past five decades, the school, its students, and the nation have changed dramatically. Each new decade has brought new events in sports, politics, music, and film. In this feature, HSPVA alumni share their favorite memories and moments at PVA, and a historical retrospective describes highlights from each decade. Many students looked forward to the "Happenings" each year, and this feature reminds us that -- inside and outside the school -- so much was happening.



If you were to visit PVA now, what would you like to see still in effect?


A new era began in this country when President Ronald Reagan was sworn into office at the beginning of the year. Although he's usually associated with conservative reform, Reagan fulfilled his campaign pledge and nominated the first female Supreme Court justice, Sandra Day O'Connor, which could be perceived as a small step towards gender equality.

What's your most vivid PVA memory?

"Encouraging words from Lady Marie Catley, English classes." - Anthony 'Tony' Martin (Instrumental '81) "We had a semester called INTERIM where for one month we could choose from a host of classes that were only offered during that time. You could even select a subject out of your art area! We always looked forward to that time of year!!" - Stephanie York Blue (Instrumental '81)

Due in part to MTV's summer debut on cable television and their endless stream of music videos, the music and television industries both grew substantially in 1981. MTV kept Black music out of rotation until Michael Jackson's "Billie Jean" in 1983, which forever changed the art of the music video.

This year was a turning point for HSPVA as well. The school moved to the 4001 Stanford location during the 1981-1982 school year, making this class the last to graduate from the original campus. It's also one of the only classes without its own yearbook-legend has it that the only original copy disappeared in the back of a van-- so, the yearbook for the following year combined both classes.





If you could do it all over again, what would you change about your experience at PVA (if anything)?

On Jan. 2nd, Sharon Pratt Kelly became the country's first Black female mayor. She campaigned as a reformer ready to sweep corruption out of D.C. and diversify the workforce by hiring women for top jobs, but her tenure was marked by bloated bureaucracy and conflicts with staffers and city workers.



Similarly, HSPVA's thenprincipal, Annette Watson, worked to diversify the student body and create reform, but she too dealt with turnover and pushback. During her tenure, the Media **Department was eliminated** and three top admin-principal, assistant principal, and dean-- retired or were reassigned. Watson also clashed with what she saw as an undisciplined student body. She shortened the lunch period and required that students buy parking permits, but they balked at her restrictions.

"I would have had more close Black friends! Shout out to Tiffany Brown and Tamilla Woodard. There was a lot of social stratification between art areas. so it was hard for **Black students in** different art areas to connect with each other. " -Toya Lilliard (Theatre '91)

Elaine Clift Gore claims in her book, *Talent Knows No Color*, that the power struggle didn't ease until internal tensions publicly aired and Watson was forced to work more closely with the HSPVA community (including parents).

In one word, how would you describe your PVA experience?

"Foundational."

Director John Singleton released Boyz 'n the Hood, an unflinching depiction of violence in South Central L.A. that stunned both critics and audiences alike. The film launched the careers of Ice Cube, Cuba Gooding, Jr., and Morris Chestnut. The role of Brenda was played by HSPVA alumna, Tyra Ferrell (Theatre '74) who, that same year, played a supporting role as a grocery store customer in Jungle Fever, a Spike Lee Joint starring Wesley Snipes and Annabella Sciorra as an interracial couple.

2001

The flights that crashed into the World Trade Center, the Pentagon, and over Somerset County, Pennsylvania on September 11th killed nearly 3,000 people and marked the beginning of the 20-year war with Afghanistan and a global "War on Terror." The attacks effectively shattered our country's sense-- and illusion-- of safety in a year that seemed full of disaster. Earlier that year, Tropical Storm Allison poured 36 inches of rain into Houston, flooding hospitals and thousands of homes. In December, Houston energy company, Enron, filed for Chapter 11 bankruptcy causing thousands of employees to lose their pensions and 401k plans.

What's your most vivid PVA memory?

"My most vivid PVA memory was being awarded the most improved musician award my freshman year. When I started at PVA, I was so far behind my peers with little experience in reading music. So for that to happen was highly motivating and it boosted my confidence." - Bernard Kelly (Vocal '01) Naturally, the entertainment industry was there to help the country cope with the aftermath. R&B group Destiny's Child, led by former PVA student Beyonce Knowles, released its 3rd album, *Survivor*. Although it came before the 9/11 attacks and after the group had replaced three members (and fielded several lawsuits as a result), the lyrics of the chorus are powerful and likely resonated with new meaning for many. *Survivor* went multi-platinum and produced three No. 1 singles, including the title track.





In May, the U.S. Census Bureau stated that for the first time, more than half of the children in America under a year old were minorities. It was a sign of shifting racial demographics; the nation had taken one more step towards its apparent destiny as a "majorityminority" country.

What's your most vivid PVA memory?

2011 was a banner year for HSPVA. The school celebrated its 40th anniversary that October with the "Encore 40" event at the George R. Brown Convention Center. The program included numbers from previous HSPVA musicals, video tributes from faculty, and a collaborative performance of "Song of Democracy" based on a poem written by Walt Whitman (which was recited by Principal R. Scott Allen). Chandra Wilson (Theatre '87), who plays Dr. Miranda Bailey on the longrunning ABC drama Grey's Anatomy, was mistress of ceremonies.

"I vividly remember standing backstage before my entrance in the show Once on This Island and realizing I was the happiest I'd ever been. I did not have a significant role in the show but in that moment I knew I was in love with the art of performance. Every aspect of the experience was incredibly fulfilling: the long rehearsals, the character study, the preshow jitters, etc. This was one of many moments that led me to pursue performance beyond my high school years." - Moretta Irchirl (Vocal '11)

If you could do it all over again, what would you change about your experience at PVA (if anything)?

"I would put more trust in myself and my artistry and recognize my worth, and allow that to lead me." - Brittany Jones (Dance '11)
