## Golden Opportunities

How do you pin down a man who, just this year alone, has released an album, performed at the Oscars and at several Blue Note Jazz Festivals, played a two-week European tour, and celebrated his second child's first birthday? Quickly answer that "You free now?" text you were only somewhat anticipating, and do your best to make good use of his 20-minute ride to the airport. Known by many as the musician whose Grammy-winning crossover album, *Black Radio*, effectively solidified jazz's place in mainstream hip-hop and r&b, **Robert Glasper (Jazz '97)** has his dexterous fingers in just about every pie at the dinner party. Join me and everyone's favorite class clown for a trip down Memory Lane that leads to and from a windowless building disguised as a gold mine.


EVET since his college days touring as a sideman for jazz trumpeters Roy Hargrove and bassist Christian McBride, Robert Glasper's list of notable credits as a bandleader, producer, arranger, and composer has grown exponentially. In addition to his early trio projects with Damion Reid on drums and Bob Hurst or Vicente Archer on bass, he has worked with various artists of the <u>Soulquarian collective</u> over the years--including Hargrove, hip hop heads like Questlove, Common, Q-Tip, and Yasiin Bey (formerly known as Mos Def), and neo-soul songstresses Bilal and Erykah Badu--and even taken to scoring films like Don Cheadle's Miles Davis biopic, *Miles Ahead* (2015) and, most recently, television series like HBO's *Winning Time: The Rise of The Lakers Dynasty* (2022). Give him another 44 years and his resumé could potentially rival that of Quincy Jones.

Some might find it hard to believe that when Glasper auditioned for the High School for Performing & Visual Arts as an 8th grader, he hardly knew any jazz at all. In the years leading up to his audition, he had actually been playing clarinet in Quail Valley Middle School's marching band As the only child of vocalist and pianist, Kim Yvette, who in

Glasper's younger days was a versatile and well-established musician in the Houston area, he was introduced to many different genres when his mother would bring him along on her gigs. However, most of his skill and musical knowledge was acquired at home and in the church pews. So, naturally, instead of playing typical jazz standards, Glasper auditioned with the Spiderman theme song—a C minor blues with a walking bass line and a few cool chords he had learned from his mother's pianist, Alan Mosley—and two gospel songs, one of which was "Take It Away From Me" by Reverend Ernest Davis, Jr. and the Wilmington/Chester Mass Choir.

Robert "Doc" Morgan, the man who ran HSPVA's jazz program for over two decades, recalls that when he asked Glasper to name a jazz pianist he admired, heunbeknownst to Doc at the time-simply read Oscar Peterson's name off a concert poster he spotted in the jazz room. In fact, even though he was accepted into HSPVA, he chose to attend Elkins High School instead because he wanted to play basketball and stay close to his then-girlfriend. It's hard to say what became of that relationship but, according to Glasper, his dreams of becoming a basketball star dissipated when he ended up riding the bench his entire freshman year. "I always say I slipped the bench over to the piano and that's been my saving grace," he shares in a recent interview with Vulture.

His gospel group, The Melodies of East Wind, helped him make use of that down time when they competed for the Sammy Davis Jr. Award against Bryan-Michael Cox's R&B group, Business or Pleasure. Glasper remembers, "It was him and three other dudes: another alum named Troy Clark, Troy's brother, and our homeboy named Scooby. Scooby went to Elkins where I was going to school, so my freshman year, he told me, 'You need to go to PVA. All of my homeboys go to PVA. You belong at PVA." When Melodies of East Wind won the competition, Cox was next in line to urge him to switch schools. There's a joke here somewhere about idle hands being the devil's playground... In hindsight, it seems that his steps had been ordered in the right direction because, eventually, he grew tired of being The Piano Guy at Elkins. They'd beg and say, "Play I Need Love.' Play this, play that. Play that Brian McKnight joint." What Robert really needed was some healthy competition amongst his peers that could motivate him to extend himself. When he finally made it to PVA his 10th grade year, he experienced that initial shock with which most of us are familiar:

"I had never seen nothing like that in my life," he says. "I hadn't even watched Fame up until that point, so I didn't know what it was going to be, but it was just cool to see other kids that were into what I was into-that were really into playing music, especially playing jazz."

For young people who choose to dedicate their high school years to honing their craft, it's no secret that HSPVA's rigorous curriculum and unique atmosphere both elevate its students to a level of preparedness that pales in comparison to other schools in the Houston area. If a student is focused, committed to persevering through the program, and-above all things-talented, opportunities abound for years and years to come. In Glasper's case, these attributes allowed him the opportunity to attend New York City's prestigious New School absolutely free of charge. Since New School and Berklee College of Music both offered him full scholarships his junior year, he didn't even have to take the SATs. He explains that, "you don't realize it until you get out to the regular world and you're like 'goddamn, we're way ahead of all of y'all' [...] I canceled out of everything my freshman year of college. Literally, they had no more classes for me." All that was left were extracurricular playing classes like Tribute to Herbie Hancock and Tribute to John Coltrane.

Eventually, as rehearsals and gigs at places like The Village Vanguard started to pile up and the tour bus took him further and further away from the city, most of his

instructors had resigned themselves to accept his attendance at the end-of-semester concerts as sufficient for class credit. "Close enough for jazz," as the saying goes. This mimicked a similar arrangement he had with Ms. Pryce and Ms. Smith Williams, the two English teachers who ran PVA's Black History shows in the late nineties. It didn't fly for some, though. "It's unfortunate. A lot of the teachers at New School had a chip on their shoulder because I was doing the gigs that they feel like they should be doing...and I'm Black. It was a lot of that whole thing," he admits. Luckily for him, Reggie Workman, former bassist for John Coltrane and Art Blakey, was a Black faculty member with good standing at the institution and he understood Glasper's situation. He'd say, "I got you. Just go out and do your thing and wear the New School t-shirt every now and then." Regardless of the industry, sometimes the key to success all boils down to who you know. When you know as many people as Robert Glasper and even more people know you as someone with the power to influence the masses, some say this creates certain responsibilities.

Just a few short months ago, Glasper and his crew had the chance to participate in a special performance at the Hollywood Bowl to celebrate Juneteenth, a now-federal holiday that has only recently begun to receive widespread attention beyond Texas' borders and other southern states. Adding to the splendor was the debut performance of the all-Black Recollective Orchestra directed by Derrick Hodge, a prolific bassist, composer, and one of Glasper's frequent collaborators. Looking back on the celebration, Glasper reflects, "It was dope! I had my daughter there, it was Father's Day, it was special. I felt like with our segment, we were able to really get something off, as far as like, a real message [...] I just felt like a lot of it was singing and dancing. I felt like we didn't really take advantage of 'this is airing on CNN.' Like, let's have more teachable moments, you know? Versus, 'hey, this person's performing, this person's performing.' People see that all the time. So, I felt like there could have been more teachable moments in a way, but I felt like we were able to do that within the art and not make it feel like a teachable moment, but it was."

Staying true to the spirit of both jazz and hip hop, Glasper recognizes and accepts the challenge of tackling social issues of the day with his music. A prime example of this can be heard in the first two tracks of Black Radio III (2022) where Amir Sulaiman, Killer Mike, BJ The Chicago Kid, and Big K.R.I.T all help demonstrate just how "in tune" he is with the current state of affairs.

"When things are happening in the world and you make an album, you have to make a choice whether you want to talk about the things going on in the world in your album or give people a break from it," Glasper explains.

"So, that's why I did that on this album and I started it with those two songs-the Amir joint and 'Black Superhero.' I did it first just to address the elephant in the room. Then if you want, you can start from track 3 but you don't have to... so, I gave them a choice but I felt like I really had to say something." It was Nina Simone that famously said, "an artist's duty, as far as I'm concerned, is to reflect the times." While she believed that real artists have no choice in the matter, Glasper let the ultimate choice lie with the listener.

Take a look at any power struggle throughout history and you'll find that there is always strength in numbers. Perhaps that's part of the reason why Glasper seems to enjoy assembling and taking

part in supergroup collaborations like R+R=NOW where each member is a visionary creator in their own right, dedicated to the duty of both "Reflecting" and "Responding" to the here and now. Regardless of the name tied to the group, whether it's R+R=NOW, August Greene (with rapper Common and drummer/producer Karriem Riggins), or Dinner Party (with multi-instrumentalist Terrace Martin, rapper 9th Wonder, and saxophonist Kamasi Washington), where two or three are gathered with Robert Glasper, there's bound to be another PVA alum on the bill or waiting on a last minute "you free?" text because, once you've found your tribe, you keep them close--even after nearly 30 years have passed.

When Robert and I had our talk, he happened to be on tour and in the car with two other HSPVA alumni, drummer Chris Dave (Jazz '90) and bassist Burniss Earl Travis II (Jazz '05)--whom we spoke with just <u>a few newsletters ago</u>. Robert likens this phenomenon to being in a fraternity.

"No matter how young or far apart you are from other people at PVA, once you find out they're PVA [...] it's like a family. You automatically look out for each other, you know what I mean? And the fact that you're doing the 50th, it just brings that all together."

R: Some of my favorite moments from being at PVA were going to Shipley's before school started. C'mon, Burniss (laughs). Was the Shipley's there when you were there, Chris?... We had that table, you know you have that special table you sit at in the morning?

G: Yep, in the Commons. Were you guys in the middle?

R: Nah, we were against the wall kinda by the recital hall. Me, Walter Smith, Kendrick Scott, Mark Kelley. I had a lot of fun in them practice rooms. Oh, we can't talk about that, can we?

G: Sure, we're out of school!

R: Those make-out sessions... I had a lot of make-out sessions in those practice rooms and in the Denney Theatre under the stage. C'mon! (laughs) I can say it now. I'm grown, I can't get in trouble.
